Indeed, our latest annual data report, bringing those Voices of Children & Young People to the fore, has just been released.

We have recently passed the half-way mark of our three-year Multi-Annual plan, and we have already achieved so much. I am so proud of you all, and I am so proud of this network. I know for certain that there are many more successes, many more improvements and innovations and impacts still to come, and many of those will have their beginnings here, in the International Consultation, just like "Toronto Line" had its own beginnings in an International Consultation several years ago.
